Rules and Regulations Governing Exhibitors

- 1. Commercial and 4-H exhibits must not begin dismantling until after 7:00 PM on Sunday.
2. NO PREMIUMS WILL BE HONORED IF EXHIBIT IS REMOVED BEFORE TIME SET. ANY PREMIUM AWARDED SHALL BE FORFEITED FOR FAILURE TO COMPLY.
3. The Association will employ watchmen on the grounds at night and exercise due care, but said Association will assume no responsibility for any damage from any cause that may occur to any animal or article on exhibition, and upon this condition only are entries received.
4. North Haverhill Fair Association, Inc., will not be responsible for any accident or damage that may occur to persons or property while on the road leading to the Fair Grounds, or while on the Fair Grounds. All stock and articles entered for premiums must be under the care and control of the owner at his risk during the Fair.
5. The Association reserves the right to limit entries in any department as space in tents and buildings is limited.
6. The management does not anticipate that it will be necessary to prorata or defer premiums, but if on account of weather, failure to receive State-Aid, or other causes beyond its control, there are not sufficient funds available, the Association reserves the right to do so.
7. Exhibitors will have the right to sell their exhibits but same must not be removed during the Fair.
8. TRAILER FEES - 4-H ONLY \$25.00 per night per trailer or 24 hour period, or \$75.00 for 4 nights. Camping fees are to be mailed to David Lackie, 3069 Dartmouth College Highway, North Haverhill, NH 03774.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL ANIMALS

Equine Infectious Anemia

No horses, asses, mules, or ponies will be allowed on the fair grounds over six months of age unless they meet the following requirements:

- 1. New Hampshire Horses, Asses, Mules, or Ponies. Owners or representatives must show a valid Negative Coggins' Test for Equine Infectious Anemia (Swamp Fever) within one year.
2. Out of State Horses - All equines entering the State of New Hampshire must be accompanied by an official health certificate, signed by an accredited veterinarian, and valid negative A.G.I.D. (Coggins') test for Equine Infectious Anemia conducted within six month prior to entry. Entry permit not required. Certificates will be checked by fair representatives and/or the New Hampshire Department of Agriculture representatives to enforce this regulation.

NOTICE: LIVESTOCK EVENTS

Doping and Stimulating

It is unlawful for any person to administer internally or externally a drug, stimulants, or appliances of a nature that could alter or affect the normal performance of an animal entered in a livestock event. The term "livestock event", as used in this subdivision, shall include pulling contests, trail rides, carriage events, horse shows, races, dressage exhibitions, private and organized sales and other competitive events involving ponies, horses, cattle or oxen.

Test Authorized

The Commissioner of Agriculture may take such tests of the saliva, urine, blood - or all three - of any animal entered in a livestock event as he/she may deem necessary. If a drug is found in the chemical analysis of said saliva, urine, or blood, it shall be taken as prima facie evidence that a drug has been administered.

Penalty

Within 14 days from the date test results in which a drug is shown to be present are received by the Commissioner of Agriculture, the Commissioner shall notify the fair association or management of the livestock event and the owner of the tested animal(s) of such results. In addition, the Commissioner shall file charges with any law enforcement agency. Any person who violates any of the provisions of this subdivision or who violates any rules adopted under this subdivision shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. Such person shall not be allowed to compete in pulling events in this state for a 2 year period from the date of the conviction.

SUBJECT: Health Regulations for 2007 New Hampshire Fairs And Shows.

SEC. I. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection: All cattle, sheep, goats, swine, equine, camelids (llamas & alpacas), poultry and ratites entering the State of New Hampshire from other states must be accompanied by a "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" signed by an Accredited Veterinarian. This Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall indicate the health status of the animals, poultry and other species involved, including results of any required tests and a statement that the animals are not known to be afflicted with any infectious or contagious disease. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, which has been issued for a New Hampshire fair / show, will remain in force for the entire 2007 show season.

SEC. II. Permanent Identification: All cattle, sheep, goats, swine, camelids, cervidae and ratites must be individually identified by permanent metal or plastic ear tag, legible tattoo or microchip (providing a reader is available).

SEC. III. Permit for Entry: Ratites, Camelids, Swine and/or Poultry: Prior permit must be obtained and the number must appear on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. Permits may be obtained by calling: (603) 271-2404 Monday through Friday between the hours of 8:00 am - 4:00 p.m.

A. CATTLE:

(1) New Hampshire Animals - See Sec. II, Permanent Identification required. All cattle must originate from non-quarantined Tuberculosis negative herds and Brucellosis negative herds under state supervision; no further papers required.

(2) Out-of-State Animals - See Sec. I and II. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and Permanent Identification required. All cattle originating from Tuberculosis accredited-free and Brucellosis classified-free states and Canadian provinces may enter the state of New Hampshire without testing. Cattle not originating from Tuberculosis accredited-free and Brucellosis classified-free states and Canadian provinces must meet the following requirements:

- a. All cattle must originate from Tuberculosis negative and Brucellosis negative, non-quarantined herds and must have been tested within 30 days for Brucellosis and within 60 days to Tuberculosis prior to entry for the first show of the current season.
- b. Cattle under 18 months of age which are official vaccinates may enter New Hampshire without a Brucellosis test, but the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must show a record of such vaccination.
- c. Calves under 179 days of age from Tuberculin negative herds under supervision tested within one year may enter the state without a test, if properly identified as progeny of a tuberculin tested dam.

B. STEERS, SPAYED HEIFERS & OXEN must meet the same requirements as stated above for Tuberculosis. No Brucellosis requirement.

IMPORTANT: It shall be the responsibility of show superintendents to eject each animal showing indications of contagious disease.

C. GOATS:

(1) New Hampshire Animals - See Sec. II, Permanent Identification required. All goats must originate from non-quarantined herds and be clinically free from infectious and communicable diseases including lymphadenitis, staphylococcal infection, foot rot, contagious ecthyma (sore mouth), scabies or scrapie; nor shall they be progeny of goats known to be infected with scrapie.

(2) Out-of-State Animals - See Sec. I and II. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and Permanent Identification required. All goats originating from Tuberculosis accredited-free and Brucellosis classified-free states and Canadian provinces may enter the state of New Hampshire without testing. Goats not originating from Tuberculosis accredited-free and Brucellosis classified-free states and Canadian provinces must meet the following requirements:

- a. All goats 6 months of age or older must originate from non-quarantined, Tuberculosis negative and Brucellosis negative herds and must have been tested within 30 days for Brucellosis and within 60 days to Tuberculosis prior to entry for the first show of the current season.
- b. All goats under 6 months of age must be identified as progeny of a negative Brucellosis and Tuberculosis tested dam.

c. All goats must be clinically free from all other infectious and communicable diseases including lymphadenitis, staphylococcal infection, foot rot, contagious ecthyma (sore mouth), scabies or scrapie, and shall not be progeny of goats known to be infected with scrapie.

(3) Goats Enrolled in the Voluntary Scrapie Program - In order to lower the risk of scrapie transmission, goat herds that are enrolled in the scrapie eradication program should follow the following guidelines:

- a. Be kept separate from nonenrolled goats by a vacant pen, a barn alley, or a solid physical barrier (such as metal, wood, canvas) sufficient to prevent any physical contact between enrolled and nonenrolled goats.
- b. Limit contacts in the show or sales ring to minimize risk of scrapie transmission. These contacts take place between animals off the herds premises and not during or immediately after kidding. Limited contacts do not include commingling, which means the grouping of animals together with free physical contact.
- c. Prevent contact with kidding animals at exhibits or sales. Kidding increases the exposure potential.

D. SWINE:

(1) New Hampshire Animals - See Sec. II, Permanent Identification required. All swine must originate from non-quarantined, Brucellosis and Pseudorabies Free herds and be clinically free from all other infectious and communicable diseases.

(2) Out-of-State Animals - See Sec. I, II and III, Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, Permanent Identification and Permit required. All swine shall be Brucellosis Validated or progeny of non-quarantined Brucellosis Validated herd or originate from a validated Brucellosis-free state. All swine shall have a Pseudo-rabies (PRV) negative test within 30 days of entry or originate from a Qualified Pseudorabies Negative herd or Pseudorabies class IV or free state.

E. SHEEP:

(1) New Hampshire Animals - See Sec. II, Permanent Identification required. All sheep must originate from a non-quarantined flock and animals must not have been exposed to scrapie, scabies or any other contagious or infectious disease, and shall not be the direct progeny (first generation) of any animal diagnosed as having scrapie.

(2) Out-of-State Animals - See Sec. I and II. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and Permanent Identification required. All sheep must originate from an inspected, non-quarantined flock; the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall state that the animals have not been exposed to scrapie, scabies or any other contagious or infectious disease; and the animal shall not be the progeny of a sire or dam that was infected with scrapie.

(3) Sheep Enrolled in the Voluntary Scrapie Program - In order to lower the risk of scrapie transmission, sheep flocks that are enrolled in the scrapie eradication program should follow the following guidelines:

- a. Be kept separate from nonenrolled sheep by a vacant pen, a barn alley, or a solid physical barrier (such as metal, wood, canvas) sufficient to prevent any physical contact between enrolled and nonenrolled sheep.
- b. Limit contacts in the show or sales ring to minimize risk of scrapie transmission. These contacts take place between animals off the flock's premises and not during or immediately after lambing. Limited contacts do not include commingling, which means the grouping of animals together with free physical contact.
- c. Prevent contact with lambing animals at exhibits or sales. Lambing increases the exposure potential.

F. HORSES:

(1) New Hampshire Animals - Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) requirement at discretion of respective show secretaries.

(2) Out-of-State Animals - See Sec. I. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required. All equines entering the State of New Hampshire must be accompanied by a valid negative A.G.I.D. or ELISA (Coggins) test for Equine Infectious Anemia conducted within six months prior to entry. Entry permit not required.

NOTE: It is highly recommended that Show Management examine Equine Health Certificates and Coggins' test papers.

G. POULTRY:

(1) New Hampshire Poultry - All poultry over 5 months of age must have been tested within one year for, and found negative to Salmonella Pullorum and avian influenza, identified by official leg band and must be progeny of Pullorum clean stock and free of all infectious and contagious diseases and exposure thereto.

(2) Out-of-State Poultry - See Sec. I, II and III. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection or NPIP VS Form 9-3 and Permit required. All poultry over 5 months of age must have been tested within one year for, and found negative to Salmonella Pullorum and avian influenza and be identified by official leg band. All poultry under 5 months must be progeny of Pullorum clean stock and free of all infectious and contagious diseases and exposure thereto.

H. CERVIDAE, CAMELIDS AND BISON:

- (1) New Hampshire Animals - All cervidae, camelids and bison must originate from non-quarantine herds.
(2) Out-of-State Animals - See Sec. I, II and III. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, Permanent Identification and Permit required. Camelids and bison must have a negative Brucellosis test within 30 days prior to the first show of the season and a negative Tuberculosis test within 60 days prior to the first show of the season.

NOTE: No cervids may enter the state of New Hampshire for show purposes due to the threat of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD).

I. RATITE (emu, rhea, ostrich, moa, kiwi and cassowary):

- (1) New Hampshire Animals - All ratites must originate from a non-quarantined, Avian Influenza tested negative flock.
(2) Out-of-State Animals - See Sec. I, II and III. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, Permanent Identification and Permit required. All ratites must have been tested negative to pathological strains of Avian Influenza within 10 days of the fair.

J. RABIES RECOMMENDATIONS:

The State Veterinarian recommends that all domestic animals (i.e., dog, cats, horses, cattle, and sheep) be immunized for rabies at least 30 days before attending the fairs. Domestic animals that do not have a licensed rabies immunization available (i.e., rabbits, pigs, and goats) may be immunized "extra-label". They can still receive the rabies shot, but it is not recognized as an immunized animal. It is highly recommended that all animals displayed at the fairs be restrained in a manner that would not allow the public to be bitten or exposed to saliva. Rabies vaccines for show participants should be administered by a licensed veterinarian so as to assure the efficacious handling and administration of the vaccine.

K. BIO-SECURITY:

When exhibiting animals at the fairs or shows, bring your own shovels, forks, brooms and wheel barrows for your personal use and do not allow them to be used by others. Disinfect all of the hand tools, including the wheel barrows, feed tubs and your boots and shoes before going back to the farm. Consider isolating all animals returning to your farm from the animals left at home for a period of time to minimize transmission of diseases that may have been picked up at the show.

Do not allow the public to walk in the feed areas and do not allow manure contamination of the feed or feeding areas.

There are many diseases, such as Johnes, E. Coli, Salmonella, etc., that can be spread at fairs and brought back to the farm. Prevent the spread of organisms.

THE 4-H EXPERIENCE AT NORTH HAVERHILL FAIR

The 4-H experience facilitates the development of young people by encouraging them to personally explore a variety of interests and participate in the sharing of decision-making and program planning. This "learning by doing" instills in the 4-H member self-respect. The positive self-image gives the individual confidence and, therefore, contributes to his or her living a more satisfying life.

The North Haverhill Fair enables members to exhibit their projects and provides them with an opportunity to receive constructive criticism. We trust everyone involved with the fair will make this learning experience a meaningful one for each exhibitor.

The North Haverhill Fair Association has generously provided this Premiums List which has been planned especially for 4-H members.

General Guidelines for all New Hampshire Shows

All NH 4-H Shows must follow these general 4-H Guidelines

1. All animals exhibited must be animals which are appropriately named on current, valid 4-H Approval Forms. All exhibitors are responsible for presenting their own appropriate credentials, such as registration papers, approval forms, and lease records at the proper time for their show. Only original registration papers are acceptable.
2. All ages are calculated as of January 1 of the current project year. No youth under age 8 (cloverbuds) may exhibit in a large animal 4-H livestock show. This includes horses, cattle, sheep, swine, llamas, and goats.
3. Age of animal. Any animal that will be shown in a 4-H class must have been born by and listed on the 4-H approval form by the specified date for that species.
4. 4-H Members are solely responsible for showing and handling their animal in the ring. If a 4-H member has more than one animal entered in a breed or market class, they may ask another 4-H member to exhibit the second animal.
5. All animals or groups of animals shown must be owned or leased by the 4-H member.
- 5a. Any 4-Hier attending the fair with livestock must show the animal.
6. All youth must participate in Fitting and Showing. They must use an animal that they will exhibit in a type, performance, or market class in the show.

7. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to know what class they are supposed to be in and when that class takes place. Exhibitors who miss their class will not be allowed to exhibit in a class designated for another group. Exhibitors who miss their showmanship class may exhibit in the rest of the show, but will receive no premiums. Exhibitors missing a breed, market, or performance class will not receive premiums for the class missed.

8. In NH 4-H shows where type (breed) classes are stipulated for registered animals only (in accordance with breed policies), a youth may exhibit a grade FEMALE in the show if they own or lease no more than one other eligible animal of that species. A grade animal is ANY animal that is not registered. It may be a full-blooded female with no papers OR a cross-bred female. It must meet age requirements for at least one class in the show. The grade animal may be exhibited within its age group in the registered division or a separate class may be held at the superintendent's discretion. Grade animals will receive full premiums. Grade males may not be exhibited except in feeder or market classes.

9. Youth will wear appropriate attire at all times while on the fairgrounds. Sturdy, closed toe, safe shoes are expected. No garments advertising any alcohol or drug products. Please see specific species for clothing used for each species.

No midriffs showing

No garments considered underwear worn as outer wear

No straps less than one inch thick

No short shorts allowed

10. Animal health should conform to current, applicable health standards as set by the New Hampshire Department of Agriculture and announced by the NH State Veterinarian, Dr. Stephen K. Crawford. In addition to current health standards, all animals exhibited at a 4-H event or show must be immunized for rabies at least 30 days prior to and within one year of the 4-H event.

11. 4-H members are the sole responsibility of their parent or guardian during the entire duration of the fair.

12. 4-H members and parents or guardians shall conduct themselves appropriately, reflecting positively on the 4-H program.

13. Youth shall represent 4-H and their project to the general public in a positive way, helping to inform them about 4-H and agriculture. Actions must reflect the highest standards of honor and integrity and the best practices relating to their animal project. No type of animal abuse shall be tolerated.

14. 4-H members shall not use or possess alcoholic beverages, tobacco, or controlled substances. 4-Hiers using illegal substances will be asked to leave. No premiums will be awarded.

15. Animals are shown at the risk of the 4-H owner or lessor. Any damages to persons or property are the legal and financial responsibility of the 4-H member and their family who owns and leases the animal.

16. Direct criticism or interference with the judge or fair/show officials (by exhibitors or parents/guardians) before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. All judges and fair/show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them. Failure to comply will result in a request to leave the fair and surrender premiums.

4-H DEPARTMENT GENERAL RULES

1. Premiums listed are offered to 4-H members. Exhibit Hall entries are accepted from Grafton County 4-H'ers only. Dairy, Beef, Working Steer & Sheep entries are accepted from Belknap, Coos, Carroll, Grafton, and Sullivan Counties in New Hampshire (Cheshire County for Sheep only), and Orange and Caledonia Counties in Vermont (and Essex County for Working Steers only). 4-H Dairy Goat entries are accepted from Grafton, Coos, Carroll, Sullivan, and Belknap Counties. Goat entries from other counties allowed as space allows, first come, first serve basis. Dog entries will be accepted from all New Hampshire 4-H'ers due to Eastern States Qualifying Show status. Other 4-H Dairy and Livestock exhibitors will be accepted on the condition that space is available.

NH - Grafton, Belknap, Carroll, Cheshire, Coos, Sullivan. Vermont: Beef: Orange and Caledonia Counties. Dairy: Orange and Caledonia Counties. Dog: All New Hampshire Counties. Goat: As space allows. Sheep: Orange and Caledonia Counties. Working Steer: Orange, Caledonia, Essex, Windsor Counties.

2. Products and articles must represent 4-H work done since September 2006, by the 4-H members as part of their 4-H project work. Articles made at 4-H camp are encouraged to be exhibited and labeled "Made at 4-H Camp." No School Projects.

3. 4-H Exhibits within the Gerald Stoddard Exhibit Hall must reach the North Haverhill Fairgrounds by 8:00 PM, Tuesday, July 24, and be set up by youth representatives of the local club. All livestock exhibits must arrive on the grounds Wednesday, July 25, NO LATER THAN 7:00 PM. Livestock will be released starting at 4:00 PM, Sunday, July 29.

4. Products or exhibits not making a satisfactory exhibit or are improperly labeled may be rejected. 4-H Exhibit Tags and Canning labels are available at the UNH Cooperative Extension/4-H Office.

5. NO DUPLICATE ENTRIES WILL BE ALLOWED.

6. Exhibits are to be shown at the member's own risk.

7. All 4-H dairy and livestock entries are due to UNH Cooperative Extension/4-H Office, 3855 DCH Box 5, North Haverhill, NH 03774, by 3:30 PM, July 2.

8. Any special needs for accommodations of 4-H members must be communicated to the Extension Educator in Grafton County prior to the fair.

4-H DAIRY, DOG AND LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

4-H DAIRY & LIVESTOCK COORDINATOR: Anita Cate

4-H SHOWS SUPERINTENDENTS: Cindy Putnam (Dairy Cattle); Debby Robie (Sheep); Richard Greenwood (Working Steer); Maureen Grady (Goat), Lorie-Ann Noyes (Dog)

1. ELIGIBILITY: The show is open to currently enrolled 4-H members, who are at least 8 years of age on January 1, 2007. See the chart under the 4-H Department General Rules section for details.

2. ENTRIES: All animals must be either owned or leased by exhibitor and enrolled as a 4-H Animal Project on official 4-H Approval Forms.

3. HEALTH: North Haverhill Fair Association requires all animals exhibited at this event must be immunized for rabies at least 30 days prior to and within one year of the fair. Rabies Certificates must be available for inspection. 4-H show staff and/or inspectors will visibly observe all animals for symptoms of a contagious and infectious disease such as ringworm. If animals are found with a suspected contagious and infectious disease, they will be removed from the fairgrounds. Animal health should conform to current, applicable health standards set by the New Hampshire Department of Agriculture and announced by the NH State Veterinarian, Dr. Stephen K. Crawford. Owners of N.H. cattle may show their animals at the North Haverhill Fair providing they are not from a quarantined herd, without having to obtain a health chart from the State Veterinarian Office. All out-of-state Livestock and Dairy Exhibitors must have an out-of-state health certificate, plus permit to enter N.H. from the New Hampshire Department of Agriculture, Markets & Foods. All animals exhibited in the fair must be at least 3 months old.

CHECKING CREDENTIALS: All papers pertaining to the registration & health of the animals & 4-H records must be certified by the 4-H show staff prior to the first showing & must be available at all times for examination. Remember, all animals must be registered on an official 4-H Approval (Vermont or New Hampshire) Form which must be available for certification.

5. FITTING & SHOWING: All 4-H exhibitors must enter their respective Fitting and Showing Classes. For Dairy exhibitors only -- Animals to be used in Fitting & Showing must be shown in calf or yearling class unless the exhibitor does not have an entry in any of those classes.

6. PARADE: All exhibitors are expected to participate in the parade on Sunday, July 29.

7. EXHIBITION: Dairy Show only: Each exhibitor is limited to one entry in each class for each breed--with the exception of Class 16A (Production), Class 19A (Animals Bred by Exhibitor), Class 20A (Dam-Daughter) and Class 21A (Produce). All 4-H exhibitors must exhibit their own animals except in cases of illness when, by permission of the Dairy & Livestock Coordinator and/or respective Show Manager, it may be shown only by another 4-H member. No one but the 4-H member will be allowed to work on any animals while on the fairgrounds except by permission of the Dairy & Livestock Coordinator and/or respective Show Manager. Any exhibitor so assisted, after one warning, will be disqualified.

8. Sheep and Goat entries may be limited due to available space.

9. ATTENDANCE: The attendance of all 4-H Dairy and Livestock exhibitors is required at the assembly Wednesday, July 25th at 7:00 P.M., (excused in cases of emergency only, with prior approval by superintendent). Daily inspection of exhibit areas will be ongoing at the discretion of superintendents.

10. SYSTEM OF AWARDS: Judging will be based on Danish system with ribbons awarded in addition to cash. Premiums will be awarded as follows: Blue - \$14.00, Red - \$ 10.00, White - \$ 8.00 Special awards will be presented according to the respective shows. All exhibitors will be asked to participate in teams for the 4-H Herdsmanship Contest. All members will receive prizes.

11. Violations of rules and regulations may cause dismissal from the fair and loss of premiums.

12. TIME OF 4-H JUDGING & SPECIAL EVENTS: (Subject to final approval of fair association.)

13. All entries must be mailed to the UNH Cooperative Extension/4-H 3855 DCH Box 5, N Haverhill, NH 03774, before 3:30pm on July 2, 2007, to be eligible to show. Please use the 4-H Livestock & Dairy Entry Blank(s) to register. LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
14. 4-H dairy and livestock exhibits, with the exception of horses, dogs, small animals, and cows in milk must be on the fairgrounds Wednesday, July 25, by 7:00 P.M. and remain until 4:00 P.M. Sunday, July 29.
15. Cows in milk can come in on Thursday, July 26th by 9:00 A.M. A milking parlor is available for all cows in milk. All milk must remain on the grounds; exhibitors will not be allowed to take milk home with them.
16. Hay and bedding will be furnished as part of awards for exhibiting. Additional bedding will need to be purchased by the exhibitor, if necessary. Please check with species superintendents for details.
17. Housing will be furnished for all 4-H animals. Tents will be used to house goats and sheep. 4- H Goats and Sheep exhibitors with access to portable pens are encouraged to bring them. 19. 4-H Dairy & Livestock Leaders, as well as, parents of members, have the responsibility of helping to enforce these rules and regulations.
20. CONDUCT: Fair premiums may be withheld, and/or exhibitors sent home, if the exhibitor or parent/guardian fails to comply with any of these rules and regulations or fails to conduct himself/herself in a way deemed appropriate of the occasion. North Haverhill Fair is a 4-H event and standards will be upheld.
21. Camping on Grounds: Reservations for camping space need to be noted on the camping form. Cost of camping space is \$25.00 per/night or \$75.00 for 4 nights (Wed./Thurs./Fri./Sat.) for 4-H families. 1. Eligibility - Entries are accepted from Grafton, Coos, Carroll, Sullivan, and Belknap Counties. Goat entries from other counties allowed as space allows, on a first come, first serve basis. Participants must be enrolled in the goat project, and be at least 8 years old on Jan. 1, 2007. Anyone who reached the age of 19 on or before Jan. 1, 2007, is ineligible to exhibit.
2. Entries - Two animals can be entered per individual class; only one entry per group class. Exhibitors must have owned or leased all animals entered prior to June 15, 2007. Registered dairy goats and recorded and non-recorded grades are eligible for participation, non-recorded grades are not eligible for Eastern States Exposition. 4-H Livestock Approval Forms signed by your 4-H Extension Educator, registration papers or lease forms, must be available for inspection by the superintendent. The show manager will verify your papers with animals. Registered animals must be tattooed as required by their respective breed associations and all animals must be permanently identified and be so indicated on the approval form. No horned animals allowed. No animals may be shown unless it has proper identification. Exhibitors must have the original registration certificate for all animals six months of age or older. The original certificate of registration or a stamped duplicate is required for all registered or recorded grade animals under six months of age. Total number of animals per exhibitor may be limited due to number of entries received and available space.
3. Identification - All sheep and goats being moved off the farm must have permanent, federally recorded identification. All animals must be tagged / identified regardless of their scrapie-free status. If you have animals with permanent, legible tattoos from a federally approved breed association (American Dairy Goat Association is one) that is sufficient identifications for animal movement as long as you carry the animal's registration certificate (with the tattoo number on it) with you and your animal. A health certificate will also be required if you are traveling out-of-state. Ear tags from a breed association are NOT sufficient for this requirement.
4. Animal Care - Hay and bedding will be furnished by the Fair Association. Exhibitors must clean their pens prior to leaving. Milk cannot be dumped on the ground.
5. Milking competition is mandatory. There will be a required FULL milk out on Wednesday night. There will be an unofficial milking competition for all members. Competition starts Thursday morning and ends after Friday night's milk out. If you have milkers, you must participate. All animals will be checked. Failure to comply is grounds for dismissal from competition and showing. You will need to bring a stainless steel milk container.
6. Eastern States Exhibition Participation - Entries for the New England 4-H Dairy Goat Show at ESE may qualify at this show. Only members 12 years old or older on Jan. 1, 2007, and receiving a Blue or Red award in fitting and showing are eligible. Animals

must receive a Blue or Red award in their respective type class; and must be owned or leased by the exhibitor prior to June 15. NON-RECORDED GRADES ARE NOT ELIGIBLE. Members wishing to qualify for ESE should fill out the ESE 4-H Animal Qualification Form and have the show superintendent verify it prior to leaving the grounds. A copy of the form should be mailed to Maryann Kasprzak, UNHCE Equine Center, 278 Mast Road, Durham, NH 03824-4735 with your ESE entry request. All entries must be returned to the State 4-H Office by August 21.

7. Showing- Exhibitors must show their own animals except in the case of illness or emergency when, by permission of the show superintendent, it may be shown by another 4-H member. No adult will be allowed to assist with preparation of an animal while on the grounds. An exhibitor, so assisted after one warning, will be disqualified. Members exhibiting two animals in a class may recruit another 4-H member to show the second entry. Show day is scheduled for Sunday. A fitting team contest will be held.

No more than two sets of clippers are to be used on one animal at the same time. 45 minutes will be allowed. All 4-H dairy goat exhibitors must participate. Scoring will be as follows: Cleanliness of animal and clipping (25 points), Cleanliness of work area during and after the contest (25 points), Proper animal handling techniques; proper use of equipment (25 points), Teamwork (25 points). Danish ribbons will be given to all participants. Prizes will be awarded to the winning team.

Dairy Goat Educational Exhibit and Poster Contest

We ask that each exhibitor display an educational exhibit. Each educational exhibit will be judged, and ribbons will be awarded. Each poster will be judged and ribbons awarded.

All entries to be sent to the UNH Cooperative Extension/4-H Office, 3855 DCH Box 5, North Haverhill, NH 03774, by July 2nd. Please use 4-H Dog Show Entry Blank.

SHOW REQUIREMENTS:

1. Open to 4-H members enrolled in the 4-H Dog Care and Training project who have enrolled their project animal with their County Extension Office prior to May 1, 2007. Approval Forms must accompany member to the show.
2. 4-H dogs may be crossbred or purebred, and must be at least 6 months of age at time of show.
3. Health Forms: Every dog at the show must be accompanied by a 4-H Dog Show Health Sheet. This document verifies that the dog has had preventative shots, and is currently inoculated for rabies. Bitches in heat are not allowed at 4-H Dog Shows under any circumstances.
4. Member Attire: 4-H members showing are expected to dress in the recommended uniform. Clean white dress shirt or blouse or 4-H T-Shirt, solid color pants, culottes, skirt, or jumper. Members should wear 4-H patches on their shirt or blouse. No bare feet.

It is expected that youth will wear appropriate attire at any time they are exhibiting in a 4-H show. The 4-H attire of a collared white shirt, black, khaki or green skirt or pants and sturdy, closed toe, safe shoes is expected. Corporate sponsorship is unacceptable at 4-H shows. No garments advertising any alcohol or drug products. No farm names or commercial advertising to be on attire.

No blue jeans

No midriffs showing

No garments considered underwear worn as outer wear

No straps less than one inch thick

No short shorts allowed

5. Participation: 4-H members are required to enter either (1) fitting and showing and at least one obedience class or (2) the family dog class only. The dog used in Fitting and Showing must also be shown in an obedience class. Additional dogs may be shown in obedience if they have the proper 4-H forms.
6. Members are solely responsible for care and handling of their dogs at all times. All dogs must be contained (penned or crated) when not in the show ring. Dogs must be taken outside of show pavilion for exercise or grooming.

Exceptions to Penned Rule:

Animal(s) being shown in ring.

Animal(s) being exercised. (This should be done outside the show pavilion in designated area.)

Animal(s) being groomed (in designated area).

AWARDS: Blue - \$7.00 Red - \$6.00 White - \$4.00

Class A - FITTING AND SHOWING: Dog to be shown on leash and judged for condition, grooming, cleanliness, and other evidence of good care and handling. Member is judged on appearance, poise, alertness, attitude, ability in leading, posing and showing dog to best advantage.

Division 1A - NOVICE FITTING AND SHOWING: Open to 4-H Members 8-13 years of age showing a 4-H dog for the first year.

Division 2A - JUNIOR FITTING AND SHOWING: Open to 4-H Members 9-11 years of age by Jan. 1 of the current year.

Division 2B - INTERMEDIATE FITTING AND SHOWING: Open to 4-H Members 12-13 years of age by Jan. 1 of the current year.

Division 3A - SENIOR FITTING AND SHOWING: Open to 4-H Members 14-18 years of age by Jan. 1 of the current year.

Class B - OBEDIENCE:

Division 4 - FAMILY DOG: 4-H members entering this class may enter no other classes at the show except the General Knowledge Quiz and the costume class if one is offered. Members may be allowed to continue in the family dog class for more than one year. However, members who have shown in classes higher than family dog may not drop back into family dog class.

Division 5 - PRE NOVICE A: For beginning trainers and beginning dogs (in their first year only). Handlers who have placed in the top of this class in a previous year are expected to move up to the Novice A level. Dogs that have achieved a CD or other title are not eligible for this class.

Division 6 - PRE NOVICE B: For all handlers working dogs below novice level, other than first year handlers. Dogs which have placed in the top of this class in a previous year are expected to move up to the Novice B level. Dogs that have achieved a CD or other title are not eligible for this class.

Division 7 - NOVICE A: For dogs which have not yet achieved a CD, shown by handlers who have not yet finished a dog at the Novice level.

Division 8 - NOVICE B: For dogs which have achieved a CD, with new handlers, or dogs shown by handlers who have finished a dog at the Novice level. Dogs that placed at the top of this class in a previous year are expected to go up to Open. Not open to dogs that have already achieved a CDX.

Division 9 - GRADUATE NOVICE A: First time showing in this level and have not received three Danish blue ribbons in this class. For dogs and handlers who have achieved a CD, but not yet working a full open routine. Not open to dogs that have achieved a CDX.

Division 10 - GRADUATE NOVICE B: For 4-H Members who have received three blue ribbons in Graduate Novice A. For dogs and handlers who have achieved a CD, but not yet working a full open routine. Not open to dogs that have achieved a CDX.

Division 11 - OPEN A: For CD dogs with handlers who have never finished a dog at the Open level. Not open to dogs that have already achieved a CDX.

Division 12 - OPEN B - For CD dogs with handlers who have finished a dog at the Open level, or new handlers working dogs that have previously received a CDX. Dogs that have placed at the top of this class in a previous year are expected to move up to the Utility level. Not open to dogs with a UD

Division 13 - UTILITY A- Open to all CDX dogs and handlers. For dogs and handlers who are beyond the open class level. Dogs that have earned UD degrees will show for danish ribbons and premiums only. Judging will be according to the AKC utility class, scored on the basis of 200 points.

Division 14 - UTILITY B- Open to all CDX dogs and handlers. For dogs and handlers who are beyond the open class level. Dogs that have earned UD degrees will show for danish ribbons and premiums only. Judging will be according to the AKC utility class, scored on the basis of 200 points.

Division 15 - PRE-NOVICE BRACE- Two dogs worked together doing a Pre-Novice obedience routine with one handler.

Division 16 - BRACE - Two dogs worked together doing a novice obedience routine with one handler.

Division 17 - COSTUME PARADE - For all participants and younger siblings. The costume may be of any type as long as it does not hurt or harm the dog. Creativity is encouraged. Judges make final decisions. Prizes awarded.

QUALIFICATION FOR EASTERN STATES EXPOSITION

Members who wish to qualify for ESE must be age 12 or over. In order to be eligible the 4-H member must attend a NH 4-H dog show held prior to August 20, and receive a minimum of 70 on the quiz, 70 in Fitting and Show and 170 in obedience class (for a total of 310). Family dog entrants cannot qualify for ESE. Dogs must be 6 months old at the time of the qualifying show. An ESE Qualification Form must be filled out, signed by the show superintendent and submitted to the State 4-H Office by August 21. Members must have a 4-H Animal Approval form on file in their County Extension Office by May 1 of the current year.

THINGS TO REMEMBER

All grooming is to be done by the 4-H member.

All training is to be done by the 4-H member.

Baiting is acceptable in Fit and Show as long as it does not interfere with other dogs.

Members might be asked questions during Fitting and Showing.

No Double Handling Allowed!

Fouling in the ring will automatically result in a white ribbon for the class.

GENERAL RULES

Eligibility:

This show is open to all New Hampshire members enrolled in the 4-H Dog Care and Training Project who were at least 8 years old on January 1 of the current year.

Show Requirements:

All animals must be owned and/or leased by the exhibitor and registered and/or leased in his/her name only. Animals must have been enrolled as a 4-H dog project prior to May 1, 2007. Exhibitors must bring their 4-H livestock approval form signed by the 4-H Extension Educator listing all animals shown with appropriate lease agreements, 4-H Youth Medical Treatment Form and 4-H Youth Code of Conduct Form.

Showing:

Exhibitors must show their own animal(s) except in the case of illness or emergency when, by permission of the show superintendent, it may be shown by another 4-H member. No adult will be allowed to assist with the preparation of an animal while on the grounds. An exhibitor, so assisted after one warning, will be disqualified. The dog must show at the level to which it is trained regardless of current handler.

Health Regulations:

By law all dogs must have a current vaccination for rabies given at least 30 days prior to July 30, 2007. You must have validated rabies certificates and proof of inoculation for rabies. Dogs must have documented kennel cough vaccination given within the past 6 months. No puppies under the age of 3 months can stay on the grounds. If you must bring a puppy with you, it MUST have a valid rabies and kennel cough certificate.

Camping on Grounds:

See general guidelines for camping and season pass information.

1. Entries in the Exhibit Hall are open to currently enrolled Grafton County 4-H members.
2. 4-H members of a club are expected to enter articles (other than livestock) as a part of a club exhibit and label them according to the class and level of entry. Entry tags are provided, and printed by the Extension Office.
3. Entries will be judged as individual items as well as part of the overall club exhibit.
4. Entries must be the work of current year 4-H projects. **NO SCHOOL ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.** Projects/exhibits of questionable quality may be disqualified at the discretion of the judge or superintendent. No duplicate entries allowed.
5. All project entries must be made solely by an individual. No team entries are allowed. Each club member needs to make a separate batch (i.e.: jam and cookies cannot be made as one batch, and then divided for each member to label as his/her own).
6. No kits allowed.
7. Clubs must pre-register with the Extension Office for space in the hall by July 2nd. Family Clubs should reserve space for an exhibit.
8. Exhibits must be in place by 8PM on Tuesday, July 24 and be set up by representatives of the local club. No exhibits may leave the hall earlier than 7PM on Sunday, July 29. Club or individual exhibits removed before 7:00 pm Sunday will forfeit premiums. Please note: Club representatives will be expected to help tear down the entire 4-H exhibit section.
9. Cloverbud 4-H members (5-7) are eligible for ribbons ONLY. Premiums will not be paid.
10. Posters must be 14" x 22" or 28" X 22". All other sizes will be disqualified.
11. The 2007 exhibit hall theme is: iMagical Moments of Summer!
12. Judging will be based on Danish System awarded as follows:

CLASS A - PAINTING, DRAWING AND COLLAGE - LIMIT 3 PER LEVEL

- Level 1 Simple free-hand drawing in charcoal, marker, crayon, pencil, or pastels, showing appropriate skill for level. Appropriately framed or matted. Paint by number or collage of mixed media. This level is for items created in one hour or less.
- Level 2 Elaborate free-hand drawing in charcoal, marker, crayon, pencil, or pastels. Collage of mixed media. Simple free-hand painting. Appropriately framed or matted. Items that take 2 to 7 hours to create belong in this level.
- Level 3 More elaborate free-hand drawing in charcoal, marker, crayon, pencil, pastels, painting in oil, water color or acrylic. Appropriately framed. (Oils are not exhibited under glass). Original hand sculptured piece. Collage of mixed media. Items taking more than 8 hours to complete should be entered in this level.

CLASS B - AUTOMOTIVE AND MECHANICS - small engines, snowmobile, tractor - LIMIT 1 PER LEVEL

- Level 1 Poster or simple labeled display. May pertain to safety, use, etc.
- Level 2 Working model or display of own design (item may be started by the judge).
- Level 3 Rebuilt and/or repaired motors (motor may be started by judge). Journal of work or story of work, including time line, needs to be included.

CLASS C - CHILD CARE - LIMIT 3 PER LEVEL

- Level 1 Beginners - picture and/or story scrapbook for small children, or small homemade toy (indicate age of child), or written report or poster (14" x 22" or 28" X 22") on some aspect of child care development and safety.

- Level 2 Report, story or poster (14" x 22" or 28" X 22") of child development observation of one age level or ways and means of handling emergency situations; on diapering and feeding a baby; or a collection of two or more handmade toys for different age levels (indicate age of children); baby-sitter's bag or box including as least 3 homemade toys or other playthings for at least 3 different ages (indicate age level of each on a 3 x 5 card) or advanced report, poster, or display of related careers.

CLASS D - CLOTHING AND TEXTILES - LIMIT 3 ENTRIES PER LEVEL

NO GARMENTS CREATED AT SCHOOL ALLOWED

- Level 1 Needle book, pin cushion, pot holder, washcloth slippers, laundry bag, tote bag, sewing box (to include at least 2 items made by the exhibitor and at least 5 of the following 9 items: needles, common pins, scissors, tailor's chalk, tape measure, seam picker, needle sharpener, needle threader, pin cushion), stuffed toy, kitchen apron or accessory such as scarf, placemats, book bag, shoe bag, duffel bag, fish gear bag, sleeping bag cover, animal blanket. Mount and identify 10 different fabric samples and include garment care instructions.
- Level 2 Simple blouse or skirt, simple dress, simple shirt, culotte dress, elastic waist slacks or shorts, T-shirts, slacks, or shorts w/zipper, culottes, beachwear, vest, gauchos, unlined jacket, jogging suit, sleeved dress, pajamas, nightgown, robe, housecoat, lounging pajamas, long dress, long-sleeve blouse, pack sack.
- Level 3 Advanced garments made with plaids, napped fabric, nylon rip stop, complicated patterns, tailored suit, pant suit, car coat, jacket, coat, advanced down or polar guard kits & quilts.

CLASS E - COLLECTIONS - LIMIT ONE PER ENROLLED PROJECT

Stamps, Geology, & Entomology. Only current year's collection may be exhibited and must be properly mounted, labeled, and identified.

- Level 1 Entomology - 10 or more specimens with at least three orders represented or 1 jar honey.
Rocks and Minerals - 7 or more with collection cards completed.
Stamps - 10 or more with proper ID and mounting.
- Level 2 Entomology - 15 or more specimens with at least three orders represented or 1 jar honey.
Rocks and Minerals - 10 or more with collection cards completed.
Stamps - 15 or more with proper ID and mounting.
- Level 3 Entomology - 20 or more specimens with at least four orders represented.
Rocks and Minerals - 15 or more with collection cards completed.
Stamps - 20 or more with proper ID and mounting.

CLASS F - CONSTRUCTION - LIMIT 3 ENTRIES PER LEVEL PER ENROLLED PROJECT

- Level 1A Pinewood Derby Cars
- Level 1 Electricity - circuit board, repaired lamp, electric game, trouble light, toy electric motor, test lamp.

Wood Science - simple wooden article. Examples: napkin holder, letter box, bookends, sand block.

Rocketry - Level 1 & 2 rockets, homemade launch system, airplanes, trains, cars, etc.

Level 2 Electricity - poster (14" x 22" or 28" X 22") of wiring diagram of your house, study lamp, display or disassembled electric motor. No kits.

Wood Science - wooden article made with use of simple power tools. No kits. Examples: foot stool, gun rack, bird feeder, bird house.

Rocketry - multi-stage model rockets, advanced model airplanes, trains, etc. No kits.

Level 3 Electricity - demonstration control board, poster (14" x 22" or 28" X 22"), showing self-designed circuit for a new house. No kits.

Wood Science - Advanced - wooden article, appropriate skills for ability and level. No kits. Examples: coffee table, night stand, book cases, bench, ox yoke, show box.

Rocketry - skill level 5 or own design - weather stations, solar exhibits, etc. No kits.

CLASS G - CRAFTS - LIMIT 3 PER LEVEL - NO KITS ALLOWED - (Recycled craft items are entered in Class V)

Level 1A Quick Crafts - This class is for crafts created in an hour or less.

Level 1 Simple crafts (1 hour or more) using any of the following materials: gimp, weaving, leather, metal, copper, enameling, shell craft, ceramics, pottery, basketry, decoupage, polymer clay, candle making, Christmas crafts, creative crafts and floral arrangements with purchased flowers.

Level 2 Nature crafts, papier-m, chÈ, basketry, ceramics, woodburning, puppets, padded boxes, macramÈ, pottery, polymer clay, hand sculptured piece (at least 2 hours). A more advanced craft using any of the materials in Level 1, showing appropriate skills for ability and level.

Level 3 Finished articles and complicated crafts showing 4-H'ers creativeness. This is the most advanced division reserved for outstanding and ambitious articles - examples: tooled leather articles, reseating, advanced mobile, pottery, etc. (Minimum work time 8 hours).

CLASS H - CROCHETING, KNITTING, AND NEEDLEWORK - LIMIT 3 PER LEVEL - NO DUPLICATE ENTRIES -

Slippers, toys, pot holders, scarves, hats, knit or crocheted items, vest, pillow, crewel work, embroidery, needle-point, sweaters, infant sweater sets, mittens, booties, afghan, baby sets, knitted and crocheted afghans, hooked or braided rugs, cross stitch and counted cross stitch.

Level 1 This level is for items created in 2 hours or less.

Level 2 Items that take more than 2 Ω but less than 7 hours to complete belong in this level.

Level 3 Items taking more that 7 hours to complete should be entered in this level.

CLASS I - DESIGN - LIMIT 1 PER LEVEL

Level 2 Notebook illustrating different parts of design and examples of how principles of design are used. Pattern made as part of a 4-H project, pattern enlarged by using the graph method.

Level 3 Personal scrapbook on any subject showing use of color, design, and art principles as learned in Palette of Fun 4-H Project. (This is NOT the 4-H Scrapbook. 4-H Scrapbooks are entered in Class R).

CLASS J - FOODS AND NUTRITION - LIMIT 3 ENTRIES PER LEVEL

ALL FOODS TO BE COVERED WITH PLASTIC WRAP - Item must be made by an individual ñ each club member needs to make a separate batch.

Level 1A Lunchbox or nutritious snacks (no fudge), granola bars, etc. Molded Candy - 3 pieces required.

Level 1 Recipe box or book - to consist of recipes used in 4-H project. Each box or book to contain a card with number of years in cooking. Recipes may be computer generated. Recipes should be completed by member - typed or handwritten. There are no size requirements.

1st & 2nd yrs. - 8 recipes (minimum)

3rd & 4th yrs. - 15 recipes - 3 different categories

5th & 6th yrs. - 25 recipes - 5 different categories

7th & 8th yrs. - 30 recipes - 7 different categories

9th & 10th yrs. - 40 recipes - 9 different categories

Level 2 1 small unfrosted cake, 1 small loaf quick bread, 1 small loaf dark bread or white bread, 1 small yeast coffee cake, (baby loaf pans about: 5 3/4" x 3 1/4 " x 2"), 1 small pie (approx. 4" diameter), 3 unfrosted cupcakes, 3 cookies, 3 bars, 3 muffins, 3 biscuits, 3 raised rolls, 3 doughnuts, 3 Whoopie Pies.

Level 3 Two similar foods for comparison, 1 from a ready mix and 1 from a homemade recipe. Include recipe and posters showing comparison, time, cost, appearance, and texture.

CLASS K - FOOD PRESERVATION - Follow USDA Canning Recommendations. Exhibit should include canning techniques & timing used. Item must be made by an individual ñ each club member needs to make a separate batch. Labels required - available at the 4-H Office. (No paraffin)

Level 1 Dried foods: herbs, apples, apricots, etc. Limit 3 entries.

Level 2 Canning Alone - jar exhibit of fruits or vegetables, meat, or pickles. Standard canning Jelly jars to be used for jellies, jams, marmalade, . Limit 3 entries.

Level 3 1 collection of 5 jars to be used in a meal. Menu card must accompany this collection.

CLASS L - FORESTRY - LIMIT 2 ENTRIES PER LEVEL

Level 1 Twig, leaf, and/or wood collection of at least 5 specimens, mounted and properly labeled. (Cloverbud and ages 8-10)

Level 2 Twig, leaf, and/or wood collection of at least 10 specimens; wildflower or cone collection of 5 specimens each, mounted and properly labeled.

One jar maple syrup (1 pint new canning jar); 1/4 pound maple sugar, cakes, or candy.

Level 3 Set of mounted pictures showing fuelwood cut and/or woodlot improvement done by the member. Minimum of 6 picture taken by exhibitor.

CLASS M - GARDENING & BERRIES - LIMIT 1 LEVEL ONLY

Leave stems on tomatoes, 1 1/4' -1 1/2" tops on beets, carrots, and onions, do not remove roots, wash thoroughly. Corn should not be husked. Spinach, Swiss chard, leaf lettuce or other greens are not acceptable for exhibit.

Level 1C Single vegetable entries - limit 4 varieties. Display must contain 3 specimens.

Level 1 Berries - one-half pint of cultivated berries from member's own garden - Limit 2 entries.

Level 2 Individual Garden - open to any 4-H member growing their own vegetables. Enter a collection of garden vegetables that includes 3 varieties of vegetables. To be exhibited attractively in a BOX, BASKET, OR BOWL of suitable size. Quantity to exhibit: 3 each of the following: beets, radishes, carrots, onions, turnips, peppers, potatoes, sweet corn, tomatoes; 2 cucumbers; 1 each of the following: zucchini, summer squash, broccoli, cauliflower, head cabbage, celery stalk, eggplant, melon, pumpkin, winter squash, head lettuce, watermelon; 5 each of the following: lime, shell, or string beans, peas in pods.

Level 3 Advance Individual Garden - same as level 2 but must include 5 varieties of vegetables.

CLASS N - HOME DECORATING - LIMIT 3 ENTRIES PER LEVEL

Level 1 Color notebook to contain illustrations of ways to combine colors and illustrations of color schemes for rooms, wardrobes, meals, and/or crafts. Better Room Notebook - show plan and project accomplishment; room plans with fabric swatches where applicable.

Level 2 Articles made for a room - lampshade, wastebasket, desk set, curtains, bulletin board, pillows.

Level 3 Advanced articles such as refinished or reupholstered articles, chair or stool resealed, lamp and lampshade.

CLASS O - PHOTOGRAPHY - LIMIT 3 PER LEVEL - All photos must be the present year's work and taken by the 4-H member. All photos must have a completed photo entry tag with them; these tags are available from the Cooperative Extension office (tags include: photo's title, photographer's name, equipment used (type of camera, flash, filters, etc. ñ digital photos will be accepted), type of processing, any enhancements made).

Level 1 Enlargement taken and matted by member at least 5 x 7.

Level 2 8 photographs, including 1 of people, 1 landscape, 1 building, and 1 animal or bird. Mounted on a 14" x 22" or 28" X 22" poster and captions given.

Level 3 7 photographs, including 4 action photos, 3 sequence pictures of how to do something: or story sequence of 5 photos, any subject. Mounted on a 14" x 22" or 28" X 22" poster and captions given. Enlarged and correctly matted picture produced by member.

CLASS P - PLAN AND PLANT FOR BEAUTY - LIMIT 3 ENTRIES PER LEVEL - All plants/flowers must be grown by exhibitors

Level 1 Cut flowers, corsages (fresh or dried), simple arrangement, house plants, or gourds (2).

Level 2 Notebook, drawings, or photographs of landscaping or lawn care accomplished. Terrarium, dish garden with 5 or more types of plants, or bonsai, Christmas greens, wreaths, swag. Advanced arrangement or centerpiece.

Level 2A Container Gardens ñ container can be no smaller than 7 square inches of space. The plants selected for the container should be of proper size in comparison to the container. Weeds should be removed and plants should be healthy. The container should be arranged attractively, use color and have variety. Props and garden ornaments are allowed/encouraged.

CLASS Q - POULTRY - LIMIT ONE ENTRY

Level 1 One half-dozen eggs from members own birds, clean and correctly displayed in egg carton or basket.

CLASS R - 4-H RECORDS - LIMIT 1 RECORD BOOK AND 1 SCRAPBOOK PER LEVEL

Level 1C Member's 4-H Scrapbook - a loose leaf or bound collection of the accomplishments covering one or more years of a member's 4-H projects and activity work. Awards and recognition should be emphasized. May include photographs, newspaper articles, important correspondence or written description of activities. Should include a table of contents.

Level 1D 4-H Reporter's Notebook ñ limited to newspaper clippings plus other 4-H writings. Newspaper clippings are to be mounted in a scrapbook. No limit to size. Covering one or more years of a club's 4-H project and activity work. Judging will be based on proper labeling ñ date, name of newspaper and reporter. Premium paid to the reporter.

Level 2A County 4-H Record - 4-H Records of current year must include the following: Individual project page(s) and 4-H story. Records can be typed, computer generated or handwritten. First two levels include: 8-10 to 11-13.

Level 2B Senior County 4-H Record - 4-H Records of current year must include the following: Individual project page(s) and 4-H story. Records can be typed, computer generated or handwritten. Senior level (14 and up) only.

Level 2C Animal Project Records - iAnnual 4-H Horse Project Record Bookî and i4-H Animal Project Recordsî are entered in this category. Use of photos and project pages can be used to enhance these records.

Level 3 Completed 4-H CCS Project Book ñ Booklets must be completely filled out, be dated, have a project leader's signature on the completion certificate and list the youth's name.

CLASS S - SAFETY AND HEALTH - LIMIT 3 ENTRIES

Level 1 Health or safety poster (14" x 22" or 28" X 22") made by 4-H member, 4-H'er made health or safety article (i.e., first aid kit of horse leg wraps).

CLASS T - ANIMAL SCIENCE - LIMIT 3 ENTRY PER LEVEL

Level 1 Posters (14" x 22" or 28" X 22")

Level 2 Reports or models (No kits) or item made to support animal science project (examples: horse leg wraps, dairy halters, animal first aid kits, horse blankets, dog coat, saddle pads, birthing kit, demonstration models, educational exhibit in the barn or exhibit hall)

CLASS U - NATURAL RESOURCES INCLUDING WILDLIFE CONSERVATION, WATER QUALITY OR SHOOTING SPORTS - LIMIT 3 ENTRIES

Level 1 Track identification (minimum three species)

Safety poster (14" x 22" or 28" X 22") on firearms, archery or hunting safety.

Poster showing understanding of the tools of a discipline (bow, arrow, targets and safety equipment for archery; parts of or types of rifles).

Basic shooting sports related crafts (ex. Archery arm guards, arrow quiver, rifle bench rest, hand crafted rustic arrow heads, etc.)

Shooter's Log for one discipline (rifle, shotgun, archery, pistol or muzzleloader.)

Level 2 Any article or project made as a part of the wildlife project including bird house, feeding station, artificial lures (3 mounted and identified). Journal of conservation field practices and observations.

Intermediate skill level craft related to shooting sports (ex. Hand crafted arrows - no points/heads please, hand crafted bowstring, hand crafted clay target launcher, handmade gun cleaning kit, etc.)

Shooter's Log for two disciplines (rifle, shotgun, archery, pistol or muzzleloader.)

Level 3 - Expert level craft related to shooting sports (ex. hand crafted longbow hand assembles muzzleloader from a kit (photographs only please - do not bring the muzzleloader to the fair).

Shooter's Log for three disciplines (rifle, shotgun, archery, pistol or muzzleloader.)

CLASS V - RECYCLABLE

Level 1 An item made from a recycled product. Limit 2 entries.

CLASS W - SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY - LIMIT 2 ENTRIES

Level 1 Poster (14" x 22" or 28" X 22")

Level 2 A report and/or exhibit showing the results of an experience or study performed in connection with science and technology related projects including computers, investigation or specific processes and activities found in 4-H science curriculum.

CLASS X - STYLE SHOW

A member may model any garment or article (except aprons) made in the 4-H clothing project. Judging will be by "On the 4-H Member" only. Garment may be exhibited in the Exhibit Hall (in Class D or Class H). Divisions are based on age, not sewing ability. Junior (age 8-11), Intermediate (age 12-13) and Senior (age 14-18) divisions, Cloverbuds can enter to receive a participation ribbon. 4-H'er must be available to model in the scheduled style show held at the Fair. First place \$10.00, second place \$8.00, third place \$6.00 and all other participants \$3.00

CLASS Y - 4-H CLUB PROJECT EXHIBIT

Level 1 Members must take an active part in exhibit planning and preparation. Club exhibit must have a theme. Exhibit is to represent what projects the 4-H club members have completed. (Premium is paid to the club.) Exhibit will be judged by the following score card: Exhibit attracts attention and holds interest (20 pts.), Exhibit tells effective story by utilizing a theme (20 pts.), Exhibit shows accomplishments (20 pts.), Quality of articles and workmanship (20 pts.), Percent of club members exhibiting at fair, including exhibitors showing livestock (20 pts.)

Level 1 Prizes: Blue - \$12.00 Red - \$10.00 White - \$8.00
